





Street Art Throwdown

Bua, aka BUA. In the first episode, ten artists compete in two challenges designed to highlight their art and technical skills, and to eliminate one from the competition. Judging their work is BUA and gallery expert Lauren Wagner. From scaling buildings to tag a billboard, to wandering dark urban tunnels to find spots to paint, every challenge allows the contestants to show off their talent while demonstrating how graffiti has evolved into an important part of the international art scene.

It's a standard reality competition, but the series successfully expresses how the style has evolved from being an urban nuisance into an internationally recognized body of work that combines traditional painting techniques with edgy modern aesthetics and popular imagery. Artists of all ages will be drawn to the series, which makes a point of highlighting the various methods used to design, execute, and master the art form. It also showcases some of the more common traditions and language of the street art community. But you don't have to be an artist to appreciate the insight it offers into the work, and the culture from which it is born.

If you are interested in watching this program, then be sure to check it out every Tuesday on Oxygen (Channel 56).



Dear No One,
