


ASCC students are working closely with their scholars on building ideas and knowledge based on their field of interest. When it comes to writing a paper, professors expect originality from their students. When using sources from a newspaper article, a paragraph from a book, a headline of magazine, and straight off from the internet students have the responsibility to credit the original idea correctly. You can contribute your ideas into the discussion along with your source to support your opinion.

Students in elementary never take plagiarism seriously, including some students in high school. I remember this other girl who plagiarized her research paper, I asked her, “Why do you do that?” “Because,” she said while her eyes rolled from a corner to the other, “I’m too lazy to write a 10 page research paper, ain’t nobody got time for that. And besides, our teacher won’t find out about it.” She spoke too soon. She turned in her paper and in less than 2 minutes our English instructor took her to the office for plagiarizing her entire paper, word for word! Not only she got suspended for about 2 weeks, she was removed from the National Honor Society setting a bad example for the other students. After facing the consequences and the penalty, she realized that plagiarism was not a solution.

Stephen Leasiolagi, an ASCC student majoring in the field of architectural drafting, commented on “Why do young scholars plagiarize?” Stephen replied, “Well, students plagiarize for many reasons. One of them is that their GPA might drop, losing their membership in honor society and their chance of getting a scholarship in furthering their education. Another one would have to be laziness; some kids tend to buy essays online, copy/paste articles from different sources compiling them all together without acknowledgment, or pay someone else to do their paper for them. I have encountered a couple of these cases before, most of them are worse than I thought it would be; as a matter of fact, one kid was sent to the deans office for plagiarism, after that no one knew what happened to him.”

ASCC formally forbids plagiarism; if caught the student will immediately be reported to the Dean’s office of student services for questioning. The student may be disciplined or counseled for committing prohibited actions. The results may lead to probation or, even worse, **SUSPENSION!** The same process applies to cheating on the exam, forgery, abusing school’s materials or the library, theft and damaging school property.

Finals are right around the corner; you know what that means, mmhmm – **RESEARCH PAPERS!** Plan your research paper by picking a topic that interests you, rather than typing something and ending up falling asleep every time. When using sources, cite it properly and well by giving credit to the original author. **DO NOT, I REPEAT, DO NOT COPY AND PASTE, READ A CLASSMATE’S PAPER FOR IDEAS, OR ATTEMPT TO BUY A PAPER ONLINE** – That my friend is still **PLAGARISM.** The results of plagiarism are much worse than you expect, so don’t do something that you’re going to regret or make your parents feel very disappointed. Think about it.




Insurgent

Katanagatari is the story of Yasuri Shichika, a swordsman that fights without a sword, and Togame, an ambitious strategist that seeks to collect twelve legendary swords for the shogunate. The son of an exiled war hero, Yasuri Shichika is the seventh head of the Kyotoryuu school of fighting and lives on isolated Fushou Island with his sister. They're interesting, varied, and after a few episodes they become pretty much able to carry the whole series. The story itself is simple at first sight, but gets pretty detailed as it goes on, with quite a bit of historical significance, meshing in excellently with the dialogue. Another thing really good in this series is its martial arts. The fights in this series are often short and to the point, but they're also interesting looks at the different fighting and weapon styles that together paint quite a complex exploration of martial arts. There are a few battles that try to be epic and as a result go way too much in the *Dragonball Z* direction, but the people they run into in every episode are varied and have great back-stories. When you want to watch this series, you really should take into account that relatively little happens in each episode, it's a very slow paced series and the dialogue takes up a HUGE focus of each episode. If you have the patience to appreciate this, then you'll be rewarded with quite an enjoyable series, and if I had to rate this anime from 1 to 10 it would be an 8. A simple, straight-forward anime of this type is often very successful, like titles such as *Rurouni Kenshin* and *Samurai Champloo*.




Advice he has for you:


“I think people should


