







we all had to adapt to living without parents and taking care of ourselves. Although this may seem extravagant, it becomes stressful if you don’t know what to do in certain situations.

When I arrived in St. George, I was homesick to the point where I would literally bawl my eyes out in the bathroom so no one would see how vulnerable I was. As an adult, I had to learn how to efficiently manage my finances for food, transportation, rent, school supplies, and personal necessities. I knew that one day I’d be on my own and this was the perfect time to force myself into living independently. It wasn’t easy being on my own especially when I was so accustomed to taking care of others, and now I had to take care of myself. Getting sick was not in my list of accomplishments here, and thankfully I didn’t get sick through the past year. I did however meet amazing Samoan families here who took me, alongside other Samoan students from ASCC, under their wing as providers if any one of us needed anything.

I really miss being at ASCC. Everything I ever needed to survive college basically was free from personal necessities to school supplies and laundry (thank you Financial Aid..Lol). On the contrary, I am grateful to be where I am and proud of the effort I’ve put into my goals in the medical field. I’m only halfway into obtaining my bachelor’s degree, and I know for a fact that it will not get any easier along my educational journey. I truly believe that I can overcome this stage in my life with the support of my family, friends (near and far), mentors, and church members.



My advice to current ASCC students who plan to further their education off-island would be to set a career goal, manage your time and money wisely, and work towards your goal. Also, ask for help if



you know you are struggling. Some Samoans feel the need to be conservative rather than ask questions of topics that may seem vague or confusing. Lastly, remember who you are, where you’re from, and who you’re representing. Not everyone is cut out for school and that’s ok, just as long as there’s progression towards a goal that you absolutely love.


Registration: Good, Bad, or Ugly?


“Suicide Squad”






MOVIE REVIEW

“The Purge: Election Year”




